

In the Gospel this weekend, three Wise Men set out in search of the Heavenly King. They left everything behind: security in their lives, their plans, families, friends, towns. They left everything behind and went in pursuit of Jesus. When they found the King in a manger, they were not disappointed! With immense joy, they adored Him.

We, too, are setting out on a journey. Obviously, we're beginning the journey of a new year. But let's not forget that we are also in the midst of a journey through life. And in that journey through life, we are asked to pursue Jesus. In that pursuit, we'll need to leave things behind. Sometimes we'll be forced to leave behind comfort or security to pursue Jesus. And when we do pursue and find Him, we'll not be disappointed! We'll be filled with immense joy!



On Christmas Eve, Pope Francis opened the Jubilee Door of St. Peter's Basilica in Rome. Later, Jubilee Doors were opened at St. Paul Outside the Walls, St. Mary Major, and St. John Lateran, all in Rome. This started the 2025 Ordinary Jubilee of Hope. A jubilee in the Catholic Church is a year of forgiveness, reconciliation, and renewal that takes place every 25 years. The Jubilee of Hope began on December 24, 2024 and ends on January 6, 2026.

The custom of passing through Holy Doors during a Jubilee goes back to Pope Martin V who, for the Extraordinary Jubilee of 1423, opened a Holy Door to enter the Basilica of St. John Lateran. In St. Peter's, it was first used for the Jubilee of 1450.

In addition to my duties in the parish, I am on the Board of Advisors for the Patrons of the Arts in the Vatican Museums. We raise money to restore and preserve the artwork in the Vatican Museums. From January 16-25, I will be making a pilgrimage to Rome with the Patrons. We will be looking at artwork we have recently restored and search for new restoration projects. I will also be passing through all four of Rome's major basilica Jubilee Doors.

Pope Francis chose the theme of "Hope" for the 2025 Jubilee. He proclaimed in his homily opening the Jubilee, "There is hope for you!" That is undeniably true! There is hope for you, and there is hope for all of us as disciples of Jesus Christ.

I ask you, "what are your prayer intentions?" and "what do you hope for?" I'd invite you to write those intentions and hopes on a small sheet of paper and place them in the container in front of the statue of Our Lady in our church. I will collect these petitions, prayers, and hopes on January 16th and take them with me to Rome (they will remain anonymous if you choose). I will carry your intentions as I pass through the Holy Doors. I will celebrate Mass for your intentions in the Roman Basilicas. And I will pray for you and your intentions throughout my pilgrimage.

I will be celebrating Mass and praying for you at the tombs of my favorite saints, among them St. Peter, St. Philip Neri, St. Ignatius Loyola, St. Josemaria Escriva, Pope St. John Paul II, Venerable Rafael Cardinal Merry del Val, and Pope Benedict XVI. Please know that even 4,000 miles away, you will be close to me and in my prayers — each step of the way.





January 5, 2025 — The Epiphany of the Lord Matthew 2:1-12

Have you ever wondered why the magi had gold, frankincense, and myrrh? Matthew's Gospel tells us, "Then they opened their treasures and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh" (Matt. 2:11). Why are these things their "treasures"? One possible answer is they were magicians and astrologers, and these three items were the tools of their questionable trade. In offering them to Christ, they demonstrate that they will cease using such items to predict or control life. They place this baby-king, the God of Israel, at the center of their lives, and not their own devices of control, manipulation and prediction.

Isn't that what we need to do, too? Consider, for example, the magical power of money, symbolized by the magi's gold. Seemingly whatever we ask of money, it does. It wields a god-like power over the world. It can predict the future by guaranteeing better outcomes for us — which is why it is such a tempting alternative to trusting in God. The problem is such absolute trust in money enslaves us to the economic forces that make money so powerful. In paying homage to Jesus with "gold" (i.e., tithing), we participate in his authority over (and therefore freedom from) the magical sway of money.

What things in your life do you use to predict or control your future? What in your life seems to give you power over the world? Those are your treasures. Are you tired of feeling enslaved to them? Find a way to open them and give them to Christ, and you will be freer.

Why Do We Do That? — Catholic Life Explained

Epiphany

Question:

Besides the Wise Men, what is significant about the Epiphany?

Answer:

Epiphany means "manifestation," or public display. The feast is usually celebrated January 6. In the US, it is celebrated on the Sunday nearest to January 6. It originates from a story unique to Matthew (2:1-12). Magi from the East come to offer homage to the newborn King, presenting him with gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

This part of Matthew's infancy narrative differs from Luke's account of the birth of Jesus. In Luke there are no Magi, star, nor gifts. Luke has Jesus being born in a stable after Mary and Joseph's long travel from Nazareth to Bethlehem. Matthew seems to have the family living in a house in Bethlehem, where the Magi find them.

Why these differences? They stem from the needs and concerns of the audience the authors were addressing, as well as the theological stance of each author. Knowing the original intention helps get at the correct interpretation of the text.

Since Matthew was writing primarily to a Jewish community, his concern was to show that Jesus did not come just for Jews, but for Gentiles as well. From his very birth, Jesus not only manifests himself to Jews, but also to Gentiles, who are prominently included in the manifestation, symbolized by the Magi and their journey. This is the most significant aspect of the feast of Epiphany. How do you manifest Jesus to all with whom you come into contact?
